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## Introduction

**Henry Mayo Newhall Hospital** is a 357-bed, not-for-profit, acute care hospital, which has served the Santa Clarita Valley since 1975. Henry Mayo is an Advanced Primary Stroke Center and a STEMI Receiving Center. The hospital features modern inpatient facilities, a neonatal intensive care unit, catheterization lab, breast center and an outpatient surgery center. Additional services include cardiovascular, trauma, emergency, intensive care, maternity, surgery, wound care, spine and joint, behavioral health, acute rehab, cancer care, wound care, imaging, lab, digestive, respiratory services, and physical and occupational therapies.

Henry Mayo has built a strong reputation in the quality of its care and its commitment to community health. With its extensive range of services, it's a key medical institution for the Santa Clarita Valley. Some standout features and honors include:

- **Specialized Care Centers:** As an Advanced Primary Stroke Center and STEMI Receiving Center, it plays a critical role in addressing time-sensitive emergencies, such as strokes and heart attacks. For the 13th consecutive year, the hospital was recognized by the American Heart Association with their Gold Plus Quality Achievement award for quality stroke care. The hospital was also named to the Target: Stroke Elite Honor Roll award for quality measures developed to reduce the time of a patient's arrival at the hospital and treatment with tPA to treat ischemic stroke. Henry Mayo is also an American College of Cardiology (ACC) Certified Cardiac Catheterization Center. Henry Mayo's Emergency Department is EDAP certified (Emergency Department Approved for Pediatrics).
- **Comprehensive Facilities:** With a broad spectrum of services—from trauma and cancer care to maternity and rehabilitation, Henry Mayo serves a wide variety of patient needs. The hospital's NICU, catheterization lab, and breast center are particularly noteworthy, ensuring patients get advanced and specialized care close to home.
- **Awards and Recognition:** The hospital's continuous excellence in care is reflected in the numerous awards it has received. Highlights include the Gold Plus Quality Achievement Award from the American Heart Association, the Gold Seal of Approval for Stroke Care from The Joint Commission, DNV Accredited Hospitals Organization Certification, designation by the American College of Radiology as a Breast Imaging Center of Excellence, and multiple certifications for its trauma care and imaging departments.

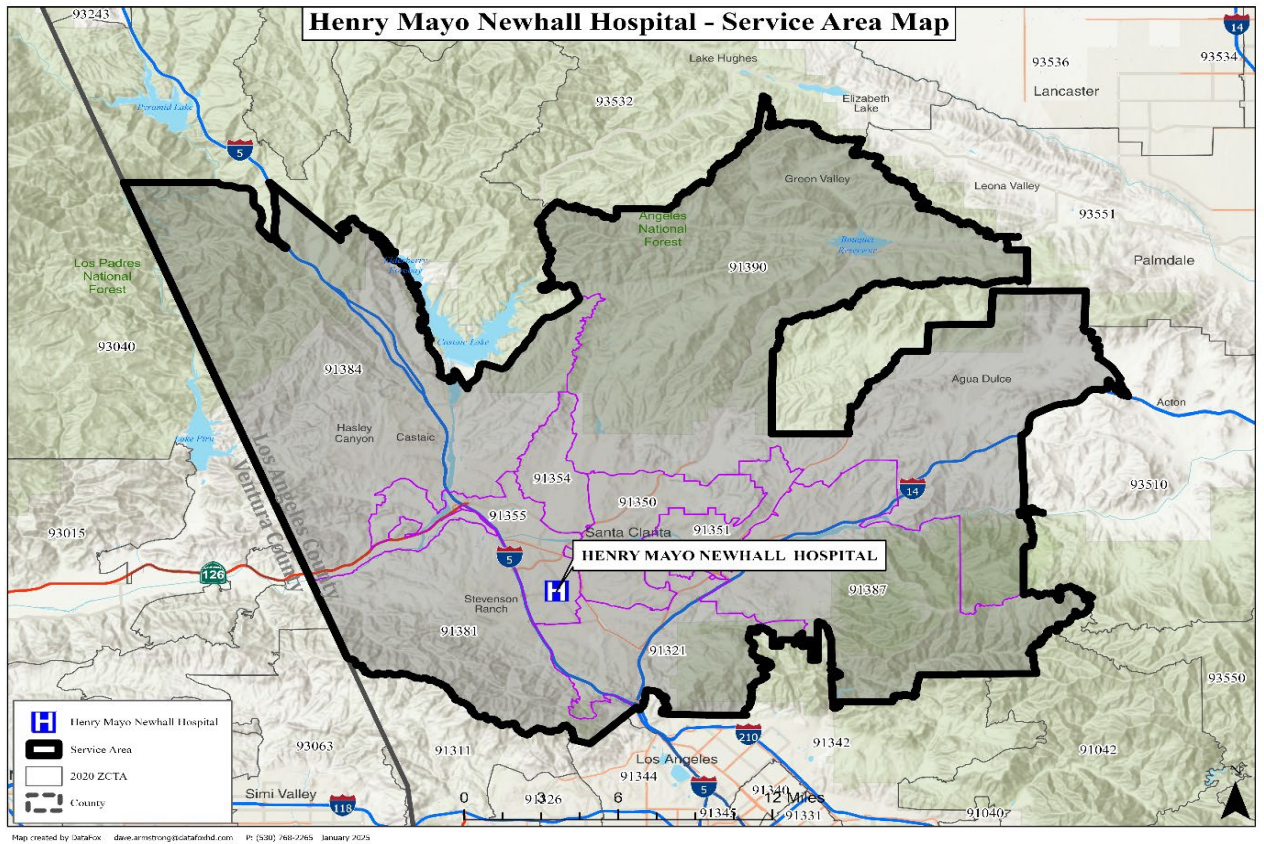
## Service Area

## Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)

In FY25, Henry Mayo completed a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in compliance with state and federal requirements. This assessment serves as a key tool for identifying the health needs of our community and informing our Community Benefit Plan.

The CHNA utilized a combination of primary data collection and secondary data analysis to evaluate the health and social needs of our service area.

To ensure a comprehensive understanding of the community's health needs, Henry Mayo conducted targeted interviews with 17 community leaders and representatives in March and April 2025. The interview sample included individuals from medically underserved, low-income, and minority populations, as well as representatives from local health agencies and departments. Additionally, input was gathered from the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health to inform the assessment.

### Significant Health Needs

Significant needs were identified through a review of the secondary health data and validation through stakeholder interviews. The identified significant needs included:

- Access to care
- Chronic diseases
- Housing and homelessness
- Mental Health
- Overweight and obesity
- Preventive care
- Substance use

### Stakeholder Prioritization of Health Needs

The identified significant community needs were prioritized with input from the community. Interviews with community stakeholders were used to gather input on the significant needs reflecting the areas where the community feels the hospital's attention and resources are most needed. The top five priority needs in the service area were:

1. Mental health
2. Access to healthcare
3. Housing and homelessness
4. Substance use
5. Chronic diseases

## Addressing Priority Health Needs

In FY25, Henry Mayo implemented a variety of activities and programs to address the priority health needs outlined in the FY23-FY25 Implementation Strategy. These efforts were aimed at improving **access to healthcare** (including specialty care), addressing **chronic diseases** (including overweight and obesity), and supporting **mental health, substance use, and preventive care**. Below are key initiatives that highlight Henry Mayo's ongoing commitment to the community.

### Access to Healthcare and Preventive Care (Including Specialty Care)

Access to healthcare is a critical determinant of health, providing essential preventative measures and disease management to reduce hospitalizations and emergency room visits. Routine healthcare, including screenings, check-ups, and counseling, plays a key role in preventing illness, identifying diseases early, and managing chronic conditions before they become more severe.

### Response to Need

To improve access to care, Henry Mayo implemented several community benefit initiatives:

- In alignment with our financial assistance policy, provided free and discounted health services to those in need.
- Facilitated access to healthcare by offering information and enrollment assistance for low-cost insurance programs.
- Helped overcome transportation barriers by offering transportation assistance to community members who lacked the resources to attend medical appointments.

These efforts are designed to improve health outcomes by ensuring timely access to preventive care and essential health services.

### Community Health Initiatives

Henry Mayo actively participated in a variety of community health initiatives and aimed at improving wellness and access to care in our region. Key activities included:

**Community Health Fairs:** Henry Mayo offered free flu shots and blood pressure screenings at local health fairs, providing essential health services to the community at no cost.

**Support for Student Athletes:** Athletic trainers from Henry Mayo assisted student athletes in the Hart School District by providing free sports physicals, injury prevention education, and training to help keep athletes safe during sports activities in Santa Clarita.

**American Red Cross Blood Drives:** Henry Mayo hosted multiple blood drives, collecting 561 units of life-saving blood – which can benefit up to 1,683 patients battling cancer, undergoing surgery, or receiving transfusions for blood disorders. In FY25, we saw 49 first-time donors and collected 143 units of Power Red donations (equivalent to two units of red blood cells). We also created a podcast, Donating Blood – Why it’s So Important, to raise awareness about the critical need for blood donations.

**Online Health Library:** We made our online health information library available to patients, families, and the public, offering a wide range of preventive healthcare tips and wellness resources to encourage healthier living.

**Physical Therapy Services:** Our physical therapists provided lectures and training on wellness, injury prevention, and rehabilitation at senior centers, schools and local organizations.

### Chronic Diseases (including Overweight and Obesity)

Chronic diseases are long-term medical conditions that tend to progressively worsen. Chronic diseases, such as cancer, heart disease, and diabetes are major causes of disability and death. Chronic diseases are also the major causes of premature adult deaths. In Henry Mayo’s service area (SPA2), cancer is the leading cause of death and heart disease is the second leading cause of death.

### Response to Need

#### Henry Mayo Fitness and Health Facility

The hospital operates Henry Mayo Fitness and Health, a full-service fitness facility that’s designed to offer health and fitness services specifically to those who are underserved by typical for-profit fitness facilities.

#### Sheila R. Veloz Breast Center

This specialized center focused on breast cancer. Offering a wide range of services, including breast cancer screenings with annual mammography, Enhanced Breast Cancer Detection (EBCD), high-risk breast cancer testing, and cutting-edge breast cancer treatments.

### **Lung Cancer Screening Program**

Lung cancer can often go undiagnosed until it reaches an advanced stage. Screening programs were offered to reduce the risk of developing lung disease.

### **Tobacco Cessation**

Tobacco use is a major risk factor for many chronic diseases, especially lung cancer and heart disease. Offering tobacco cessation programs to help people quit smoking can significantly reduce their risk of developing these conditions.

### **Community Education Classes**

Classes were offered to help raise awareness about the risks of cancer, heart disease, and other diseases, as well as promote healthy lifestyle choices.

### **Let's Get Back to Screening**

This initiative focused on encouraging people who have skipped regular screenings to get back on track with preventive care. It is a reminder that regular screenings can catch diseases early when they are more treatable.

### **Survivorship Program**

For those who have battled cancer, the survivorship program provided follow-up care, psychological support, and resources for living a full life post treatment.

### **Cancer Awareness Events**

Henry Mayo distributed *It's Your Health* magazine twice a year and produced a bimonthly podcast reaching over 3,500 listeners.

### **American Cancer Society Relay for Life**

This event is a cornerstone for community involvement in cancer awareness and fundraising. With over 1,000 attendees, it raised awareness and offered emotional and social support for cancer survivors and their families.

### **Girl Talk Classes on Cancer**

Offered education specifically for females through “Girl Talk” classes. Sessions were offered to empower participants to take proactive steps for cancer prevention, make healthy lifestyle choices, and understand their risks. These classes discussed breast cancer, cervical cancer, and the importance of regular screenings.

### **Cancer Talks to Local Women’s Groups and Nonprofit Organizations**

Our cancer physicians engaged directly with local women’s and nonprofit groups, demonstrating a commitment to reaching diverse audiences and giving them the tools and knowledge to prevent cancer early. These talks provided an opportunity for people to ask questions and understand their health in a more personalized way.

### **Breast Cancer Awareness Month Events**

Henry Mayo offered a variety of events throughout the month of October to mark Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Our community events educated the public on the importance of early detection and self-examination. These events included educational seminars and mammogram screenings.

### **Support for Circle of Hope**

Henry Mayo’s support for Circle of Hope provided financial assistance to cancer patients facing high medical costs.

### **Mental Health and Substance Use**

Henry Mayo believes that positive mental health is strongly associated with improved overall outcomes. Contributors to mental health can include chronic stress due to financial pressures, work demands, family responsibilities, poverty, and lower levels of education. In the CHNA, expanding access to mental health services emerged as a high priority.

### **Psychiatric Care**

Henry Mayo operates an LPS-designated acute psychiatric care facility serving adult men and women experiencing psychological crisis. The Behavioral Health Unit treats individuals with a wide range of acute psychiatric conditions, including:

- Major depression
- Bipolar disorder
- Schizoaffective disorder
- Schizophrenia

**Comprehensive services included:**

- Assessment of emotional and psychological issues
- Initial health screening
- Case management
- Medication Management
- Individualized treatment planning
- Community integration planning
- Referrals for ongoing patient or community-based care

**Additional Response to Mental Health and Substance Use Needs**

Henry Mayo expanded its mental health outreach through community classes, support groups, and wellness education. Henry Mayo plans to open an EmPATH unit in the summer of 2026.

**Mindfulness and Emotional Well-Being Programs**

Hosted Practice Mindful and Strong, a relaxation and mental wellness class aimed at reducing stress, anxiety, and depression. Participants benefited from improved sleep, reduced chronic pain, enhanced self-esteem, and stronger, more positive relationships.

**Support Groups**

To foster peer support and community connection, Henry Mayo offered multiple support groups, including:

- Al-Anon
- Alzheimer’s Caregiver Support Group
- Grief
- OCD GOAL Support Group
- OCD Parent Support Group

- Overeaters Anonymous
- Southern California Reinforcing Amputee Peer to Peer Interaction
- Women for Sobriety

These groups provided safe environments for individuals and families to share experiences, reduce isolation, and access ongoing support.

### **Wellness Wednesday Program**

The Wellness Wednesday series provided monthly educational content covering a broad range of topics:

- Supplements
- Heart Health
- Nutrition
- Stress Management
- Brain Health
- Eye Health

This program helped community members build sustainable habits that support long-term physical and emotional well-being.

### **Drug Takeback Program**

Henry Mayo's drug takeback program offered a safe and convenient way for community members to dispose of unused or expired prescription medications by depositing them in a medication-safe container located in the hospital lobby. In FY25, the hospital collected nearly 1,852 pounds of medications, helping prevent misuse, accidental ingestion, and environmental contamination.

## Other Community Benefit Services

Henry Mayo provided community benefit services in addition to those programs focused on addressing priority health needs.

## Health Professions Education

Henry Mayo served as a training site for a wide range of health professionals. The hospital partnered with programs in:

- Nursing
- Respiratory therapy
- Pharmacy
- Clinical laboratory sciences

Students received hands-on clinical training and preceptorship experiences, helping build the future healthcare workforce and strengthening the region's clinical capacity.

## Cash and In-Kind Donations

Henry Mayo provided in-kind support through the donation of meeting space to nonprofit organizations and community groups. The hospital also made monetary contributions to organizations that advance community benefit objectives and address significant health needs in the region.

### **In FY25, Henry Mayo supported (partial listing):**

- American Cancer Society
- Circle of Hope
- Bridge to Home
- Hart School District

These contributions strengthened local capacity to address cancer support, homelessness services, youth and family programs, and other community health needs.

## Community Benefit Operations

In FY25, community benefit operations funding supported:

- Administrative support dedicated to community benefit functions
- Community benefit consultants for CHNA development, analysis, and reporting

These investments ensure ongoing compliance, strategic planning, and effective implementation of community-focused programs.

Henry Mayo representatives participated in organizations and collaboratives that promoted community health, safety, economic stability, and regional well-being. The hospital also engaged in advocacy at the local, regional, and state levels to support improved healthcare access and public health policy.

## Community Benefit Plan FY26

### Prioritized Health Needs the Hospital Will Address

Once the CHNA was completed, hospital leaders met to discuss the significant health needs. The following criteria were used to determine the significant health needs the hospital will address in the Implementation Strategy:

**Existing Infrastructure:** There are programs, systems, staff and support resources in place to address the issue.

**Established Relationships:** There are established relationships with community partners to address the issue.

**Ongoing Investment:** Existing resources are committed to the issue. Staff time and financial resources for this issue are counted as part of the community benefit effort.

**Focus Area:** The hospital has acknowledged competencies and expertise to address the issue, and the issue fits with the organizational mission.

The CHNA served as the resource document for the review of significant health needs as it provided data on the scope and severity of issues and included community input on the health needs. The community prioritization of needs was also taken into consideration. As a result of the review of needs and application of the above criteria, Henry Mayo will address the following priority needs:

- Access to Healthcare
- Chronic Diseases – Cancer, Diabetes, and Heart Disease
- Mental Health
- Preventive Practices

### Health Need: Access to Healthcare and Preventive Care

#### Goal

Improve the health of medically underserved individuals in the community.

#### Strategies

1. In partnership with Keck Medicine of USC, provide access to cancer care and other specialty services.
2. Provide donations and in-kind support to nonprofit community organizations that address access to health and preventive services.
3. Provide financial assistance through free and discounted care and government health programs for low-income patients for healthcare services, consistent with

- the hospital's financial assistance policy.
4. Participate in community health fairs and provide flu shots, screenings, and weight and BMI checks. Athletic trainers assist high school student athletes and provide free sports physicals, education and training to prevent sports injuries. Provide preventive healthcare messages and wellness resources.
  5. Provide transportation support to increase access to healthcare services.

### Health Need: Chronic Disease (Including Cancer, Diabetes and Heart Disease)

#### Goal

Reduce the impact of chronic diseases on health.

#### Strategies

1. Provide cancer screening services, smoking cessation, nutrition and health education classes and community events to increase cancer prevention awareness in the Santa Clarita Valley.
2. Provide donations and in-kind support to nonprofit community organizations dedicated to addressing chronic diseases, healthy eating and physical activity.
3. Offer community CPR classes.
4. Operate the Henry Mayo Fitness and Health facility, which provides subsidized fitness services.
5. Provide community health sessions focused on chronic disease prevention, management, and treatment, nutrition and healthy eating. Participate in community health awareness and outreach events. Provide free educational information at health fairs.
6. Provide free bimonthly health podcasts and a twice-yearly print magazine that focus on disease management and healthy lifestyle topics.
7. Provide support groups for people with chronic diseases and their families or caregivers.

### Health Need: Mental Health

#### Goal

Increase access to mental health services in the community.

#### Strategies

1. Provide donations and in-kind support to nonprofit community organizations that address mental health services.
2. Open an EmPATH Unit (emergency psychiatry assessment, treatment and healing). Provide a calming, therapeutic environment for adults who are

- experiencing a mental health crisis and need observation-level care.
3. Provide free education classes and community events to increase knowledge of mental health issues and to increase awareness of prevention and treatment services available in the community.
  4. Henry Mayo's Behavioral Health Unit is an LPS-designated acute psychiatric care facility, for adult male or female patients in psychological crisis. The Unit treats people with a wide range of acute psychiatric illnesses, including major depression, bipolar disorder, schizoaffective disorder and schizophrenia. Henry Mayo also partners with ROWI, an on-site mental health treatment facility for teens.
  5. Provide a relaxation class, *Practice Mindful and Strong*, that focuses on reducing stress, anxiety and depression.
  6. Offer support groups for individuals and family members who are dealing with mental health issues.

## Evaluation of Impact

Through the CHNA process, community stakeholders provided input on the community health needs impacting the community, prioritization of the needs, and resources to address the needs. Appendix 2 identifies the community groups and local officials that were consulted.

Henry Mayo is committed to monitoring and evaluating key initiatives to assess the programs and activities outlined in this Community Benefit Plan. We have implemented a system for the collection and documentation of tracking measures, such as the number of people reached or served, and collaborative efforts to address health needs. An evaluation of the impact of the hospital's actions to address these significant health needs will be reported in the next scheduled CHNA.

We note that ongoing federal and state regulatory and legislative changes are putting severe financial pressure on Henry Mayo and the hospital industry and unless we get relief, hospitals, including Henry Mayo, will likely not have sufficient resources to continue to provide the levels of community benefit our communities have received in the past.

## Needs the Hospital Will Not Address

Since Henry Mayo cannot directly address all the health needs present in the community, we will concentrate on health needs that can be most effectively addressed given the organization's capabilities and resources. Given existing hospital and community resources, Henry Mayo will not directly address the remaining health needs identified in the CHNA, which were housing and homelessness, overweight and obesity, and substance use. The hospital recognizes that some needs are better addressed by other community partners but will continue to seek opportunities to support community well-being where meaningful contributions can be made.
